Who are the Psychological Professions?

There are many varied roles and careers for those interested in applying psychological ideas and approaches to working in mental health or physical health care

Several new psychological practitioner and associate roles have been locally developed and have gained significant interest.

In March 2022, there were over 20,000 whole time equivalent (WTE) psychological professionals working in NHS-commissioned mental health services in England.

This number does not include psychological professionals working in physical healthcare settings, GP services or in non-NHS commissioned setting

Developing a Diverse Workforce (widening access)

- We need to expand all the PP roles to meet national and regional ambitions
- We also need PPs from every community and background to reflect the communities we serve
- Our patients, service users and experts by experience tell us they want to receive health care from skilled professionals who can relate to them holistically including their diverse identities
- Currently psychological professionals don't always represent the communities they serve
- The PPN SW is supporting several workstreams across the PP roles to widen participation, reduce barriers to accessing training and increase representation of the workforce

Low Intensity Practitioner Pathway: CWP

- Cohort 9 PG Dip CWP Training Programme to begin in January 2024
- Up to 50 RtT training places for South West region- Post Grad Dip and Dip entry
- Potential applicants apply for fully funded roles directly through NHS jobs or other local recruitment portals
- Early intervention role for Low Mood, Anxiety and Behavioural difficulties and wider community facing support
- HEE grad level Recruit to Train pathway and support funding for each practitioner

Low Intensity Practitioner Pathway: EMHP

- PG Dip / Dip Wave7 EMHP September 2023 (Exeter) and Wave 8 January 2024 (Bristol)
- Regional EMHP training places for South West region allocated to services through NHSE
- Potential applicants apply for fully funded roles directly through NHS jobs or other local recruitment portals
- Early intervention role for Low Mood, Anxiety and Behavioural difficulties and wider education facing support, intervention and Whole School approaches

Low Intensity Practitioner Pathway: Senior Role and Supervision

- New Senior role curriculum and delivery began in January 2023
- Available for qualified CWP and EMHP career progression role at Band 6
- Provides enhanced clinical practice skills and inclusion of supervision option
- Support development and championing of early intervention pathways

Low Intensity Practitioner Pathway: Registration and Accreditation

- The British Psychological Society (BPS) and the British Association for Behavioural and Cognitive Psychotherapies (BABCP) have been approved to provide registration for CWPs and EMHPs
- This will follow once course accreditation has been finalised
- Individual registration open to practitioners who have studied at the University shortly after these programmes have achieved accreditation status
- Trainees starting pre-2023 /previously completed will be eligible for registration.

- And even individuals


Family therapy is particularly effective for child and adult focused problems. It can deal with a range of problems including:

- Attachment difficulties
- Eating disorders
- Adolescent suicidality and depression
- Self harm
- School related difficulties
- Relationship and couple distress
- Alcohol and drug misuse
- Adult depression and anxiety



Routes to qualification

- Family and Systemic Psychotherapy training is a four-year part-time Masters level
 Qualification route
- This training route requires applicants to have already completed training in a relevant health and social care profession and hold a relevant Prior Professional Qualification (PPQ) e.g. be a Clinical Psychologist, social worker, mental health nurse etc, usually at post-graduate level.
- Applicants who do not hold a relevant PPQ may apply via the Accreditation of Prior Experiential Learning (APEL) route to demonstrate the necessary prior knowledge and skills directly to the institute they wish to train with.





About us

- AFT is made up of a core team, board and trustees, committees and branches.
- Our core team is led by CEO Hannah Sherbersky and comprises of group of experienced and passionate professionals, dedicated to supporting our vision.



DOCTORATE IN CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY

WHO ARE CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGISTS ANYWAY?

Clinical Psychologists hold numerous roles:

- leadership and management,
- assessment and therapy,
- research and audit,
- supervision and training others.

Clinical Psychologists work in multiple settings, mostly NHS:

- neuropsychology,
- •health,
- older adult, adult and child mental health,
- •learning disabilities
- •forensic
- •academia

ENTRY CRITERIA FOR DCLINPSY TRAINING MINIMUM CRITERIA

Applicants must have Graduate Basis for Chartered Membership with the BPS

English language (a score of at least 7.0 on IELTS) – just relevant for international students

Meet residence requirements based on the NHS Bursary Scheme.

References (academic and clinical)

Minimum 2.1 (or 2:2 + minimum postgraduate (Masters level that has a clear research component UNLESS contextual admissions)

Clinical experience of working with people with psychological needs

CONTEXTUAL ADMISSIONS

Individual level	Disability Young carer Care experienced First generation graduate Were eligible for Free School Meals scheme Asylum seeker or refugee
School level	Low performing school School or college with low transition to HE (National data)
Area level	Socioeconomic disadvantage (POLAR quintiles 1&2)

PHASES OF POSITIVE ACTION

All candidates shortlisted

All candidates rank ordered and selected for either interview invitation or reserve list for interview All those not invited for an interview (including those on reserve list) who indicate they are from a racialized minority put through to Positive Action

Completed shortlisting scores checked against minimum interview criteria

Those who meet criteria invited to interview

WHAT DOES DCLINPSY TRAINING CONSIST OF

- •3 years of three elements: teaching, placement, research
- Teaching in CBT plus at least one other therapy (at Exeter we do systemic and CAT)
- •All areas where psychologists may work covered in the curriculum
- Academic assessments linked to what is taught, e.g. essays, case reports, presentations
- Many courses also offer secondary accreditation by the BABCP, AFT or ACAT
- •Placements assess core competencies, may be in child, learning disabilities, older adults, adult, health, forensic, etc.
- •Research is doctoral level. Must produce a literature review, main research project and service related project (audit)

MENTORING SCHEME

- •Breaking Through Mentoring Scheme is a Plymouth and Exeter DClinPsy inivitative aimed at helping people of colour to break through into the profession of clinical psychology and gain a place on the doctorate course.
- Anyone who identifies as a person of colour can apply
- Mentoring involves group sessions that provide guidance, advice, encouragement and support

Recap

- Avoid or explain any jargon, and generally be mindful of language, privilege and power
- From as early as possible in the process, show that you value the involvement of people with lived experience and understand the concept of coproduction
- Weave in any relevant aspects of your own lived experience
- Consider what characteristics make a brilliant psychological professional
- Reach out and make contact with prospective employers prior to submitting an application
- Remember that not everyone involved in selection will be a professional, academic or clinician
- If you were struggling, think about what you would want from a psychological professional, or what you would want for a close friend or a family member who you're really fond of
